1.0 Introduction

The *Convention on Biological Diversity*¹ defines biodiversity as the variability among living organisms from all sources including, *inter alia*, terrestrial, marine and other aquatic ecosystems and the ecological complexes of which they are part; including diversity within species, between species and of ecosystems². In addition, the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP) defines biodiversity as the variety of life on Earth and the natural patterns it forms³. It has been observed that biodiversity comprises not only the world's species with their unique evolutionary histories, but also genetic variability within and among populations of species and the distribution of species across local habitats, ecosystems, landscapes, and whole continents or oceans⁴. In addition, it has been pointed out that biodiversity can be organized at three levels: the genetic, species, and ecosystem levels⁵.

Biodiversity provides numerous functions and services towards Sustainable Development. According to UNEP, biodiversity forms the web of life, of which humans are integral and upon which people and the planet depend on for their health and well-being⁶. Biodiversity sustains life on Earth since species and organisms work together in ecosystems, like an intricate web, to maintain balance and support life on the planet⁷. It has been observed that through these complex interactions, biodiversity supports everything in nature that is vital for survival including food, clean air, clean water and medicines⁸. Biodiversity underpins Sustainable Development since it provides essential ecosystem services including clean air, water and food, supporting the livelihoods of millions of people all over the world and fostering resilience to environmental

threats such as climate change⁹. It is estimated that over half of the global Gross Domestic Product (GDP) is directly dependent on nature¹⁰.

Despite its role in promoting Sustainable Development, it has been observed that nature is declining globally at rates unprecedented in human history and the rate of species extinction is accelerating, with grave impacts on people and the planet¹¹. Effective biodiversity conservation is therefore key towards halting and reversing the loss of nature towards Sustainable Development.

2.0 The Need for Effective Biodiversity Conservation

Biodiversity conservation refers to the practice of protecting and managing the variety of life on Earth, including species, ecosystems, and genetic resources¹². It has also been described as the practice of protection, restoration, and management of natural ecosystems and species diversity in order to maintain and enhance biodiversity¹³. Through effective biodiversity conservation, it is possible to maintain the functioning of natural ecosystems on the planet and the services they provide, such as clean air and water, soil fertility, climate regulation, and the production of food, fiber, energy and natural medicines¹⁴. In addition, it has been observed that sound biodiversity conservation aims to prevent extinction of species, maintain ecosystem functions, and promote sustainable use of natural resources towards Sustainable Development¹⁵.

Effective Biodiversity Conservation Efforts: Leveraging Law, Local Governance, and Indigenous Knowledge for Sustainable Development

Effective biodiversity conservation is therefore necessary in the pursuit of Sustainable Development. In particular, it has been observed that as ecosystems, species and habitats degrade and disappear worldwide, the interconnectedness of all forms of life on our planet is at risk hence the need for effective and appropriate biodiversity conservation¹⁶. Biodiversity loss is being witnessed all over the world at an alarming and unprecedented scale. Biodiversity loss refers to the reduction of any aspect of biological diversity (diversity at the genetic, species and ecosystem levels) in a particular area through various causes such as death (including extinction), destruction or manual removal¹⁷. It has been observed that biodiversity loss can occur at many scales, from global extinctions to local population extinctions, leading to a decline in total diversity at the same scale¹⁸.

It has been observed that biodiversity loss is accelerating at an unprecedented rate all over the world, with approximately 1 million species at risk of extinction and critical ecosystems and habitats being degraded and destroyed¹⁹. UNEP observes that species are now disappearing hundreds, or even thousands, of times faster than the natural background rate of extinction with ecosystems also being damaged and degraded globally²⁰. Global biodiversity loss is largely driven by human activities including unsustainable urban development, agricultural expansion into habitats and ecosystems, pollution, deforestation, land degradation, over extraction of resources, and human-induced climate change²¹.

The ongoing global biodiversity loss is a major threat to Sustainable Development. For instance, it has been correctly observed that biodiversity loss can lead to a breakdown in the functioning of the ecosystem where decline, degradation or disappearance has happened²². This impacts the availability and quality of vital ecosystem goods and services including food, clean water, clean air, medicines, pollination, nutrient cycling, erosion control and climate regulation thus

impacting livelihoods and human and ecosystem health²³. It has been observed that biodiversity loss results in reduction in nature's functional capacity to deliver ecosystem services, such as pollination, climate regulation, water purification and nutrient cycling²⁴. Consequently, it has been argued that biodiversity loss highlights the ecological interdependence of species and the need to maintain biodiversity for human and ecosystem health towards Sustainable Development²⁵.

Effective biodiversity conservation efforts are therefore required in order to promote Sustainable Development for the benefit of both people and planet.

3.0 Promoting Effective Biodiversity Conservation Efforts towards Sustainable Development

Bolstering biodiversity conservation is a crucial global agenda that needs to be achieved in order to ensure Sustainable Development. At the global level, the *Convention on Biological Diversity*²⁶ provides a legally binding framework that aims to promote effective conservation of biodiversity in the pursuit of Sustainable Development. The Convention aims to foster the conservation of biological diversity, the sustainable use of its components and the fair and equitable sharing of the benefits arising out of the utilization of genetic resources²⁷. In addition, the *Kunming-Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework (GBF)*²⁸ was adopted in order to strengthen efforts to conserve biodiversity worldwide for Sustainable Development. The Framework aims to halt and reverse biodiversity loss and ensure sustainable use of biodiversity towards meeting the objectives of the Convention on Biological Diversity and enhancing the role of biodiversity in the Sustainable Development agenda²⁹. Effective biodiversity conservation is also a key theme under the *2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development*³⁰. For example, Sustainable Development Goal (SDG) 15 seeks to *inter alia* halt and reverse the loss of biodiversity towards Sustainable Development³¹.

In order to translate the foregoing commitments into actionable plans, programmes and policies that can bolster biodiversity conservation, there is need to leverage law. It has been observed that law is a powerful tool in biodiversity conservation since it translates environmental and biodiversity goals into binding and enforceable obligations for governments, the private sector,

individuals and society at large³². Law can strengthen biodiversity conservation efforts at both the global and national levels. For example, at the global level, international obligations such as those under the Convention on Biological Diversity prescribe common commitments on biodiversity conservations and measures to attain them³³. In addition, it has been observed that national legislation provides a framework to regulate certain behaviour in respect of biodiversity, a set of measures and incentives to achieve certain results in respect of biodiversity conservation, and appropriate institutions to guide biodiversity conservation efforts³⁴. It is therefore necessary to leverage law in order to achieve sound biodiversity conservation at both the global and national levels. In particular, at the global level, complying with international obligations such as those under the Convention on Biological Diversity and the Kunming-Montreal GBF can ensure that law is effectively utilised towards strengthening biodiversity conservation. In addition, at national levels, law can be appropriately utilised to bolster biodiversity conservation including through developing effective and enforceable National Biodiversity Strategies and Action Plans (NBSAPs) which outline national priorities, actions, and commitments to halt and reverse biodiversity loss towards safeguarding nature³⁵.

In addition to law, local governance provides an appropriate strategy towards achieving effective biodiversity conservation. For example, it has been observed that this approach recognises the role of governments at other levels including regions, cities and suburban areas that are biodiversity-rich or are located in biodiversity hotspots³⁶. It has been argued that by being the closest level to the people, local governments have contextual knowledge about their territories and the biodiversity challenges affecting them³⁷. They are therefore appropriately designed to develop and implement effective biodiversity solutions that take into account the specific geographic, climatic, economic, and cultural conditions of local populations³⁸. Embracing local governance is therefore key towards utilising context-specific and culturally-relevant efforts for effective biodiversity conservation.

Further, there is need to harness indigenous knowledge in order to achieve sound biodiversity conservation. It has been observed that the knowledge and traditional practices of indigenous

peoples and local communities are rooted in a deep understanding of and respect for the environment and ecological systems and promote sustainable use of natural resources towards Sustainable Development³⁹. Indigenous peoples and local communities all over the world are custodians of unique and valuable knowledge systems and practices that emphasize harmony between people and planet⁴⁰. The practices of indigenous and local communities have a minimal impact on the environment and are highly adaptive to ecological changes, fostering healthy and resilient ecosystems and are therefore an effective solution towards tackling biodiversity loss and climate change among other environmental threats⁴¹. In particular, it has been observed that indigenous knowledge systems including Traditional Ecological Knowledge (TEK) have enabled indigenous and local communities to ensure sound biodiversity conservation and ecosystem management since time immemorial⁴². Indigenous knowledge including TEK can promote sound biodiversity conservation through practices such as sustainable agriculture and land management which is an approach that embraces agroforestry, crop rotation and use of climate-resilient crops⁴³; sustainable water management⁴⁴; medicinal use of native plants⁴⁵; management of invasive species⁴⁶; and sound conservation of ecosystems including forests and fresh water resources⁴⁷. Leveraging indigenous knowledge systems including TEK and ensuring the effective and meaningful participation of indigenous and local communities in conservation efforts is therefore key towards achieving sound biodiversity conservation towards Sustainable Development.

4.0 Conclusion

With the world witnessing an unprecedented and alarming loss of biodiversity, it is imperative to strengthen conservation efforts in order to halt and reverse biodiversity loss for Sustainable Development. In particular, leveraging law, local governance and indigenous knowledge provides a suitable and appropriate approach that can promote effective biodiversity conservation efforts for people and planet.
